#### **Robert Hayden and Dudley Randall**

Robert Hayden was born on August 4, 1913 in Detroit. Dudley Randall was born on January 14, 1914 in Washington DC, and moved to Detroit with his family on January 1, 1920. They are the two best-known poets from the Detroit communities known as Black Bottom and Paradise Valley. Their interest in poetry drew the two young writers together and began a lifelong friendship. Both majored in English at Wayne State University, and both secured graduate degrees at the University of Michigan-Ann Arbor, Hayden in creative writing and Randall in library science. Ultimately, both poets achieved international recognition and critical acclaim as poets, and, as editors and educators, they made major contributions to the African American literary canon.
